

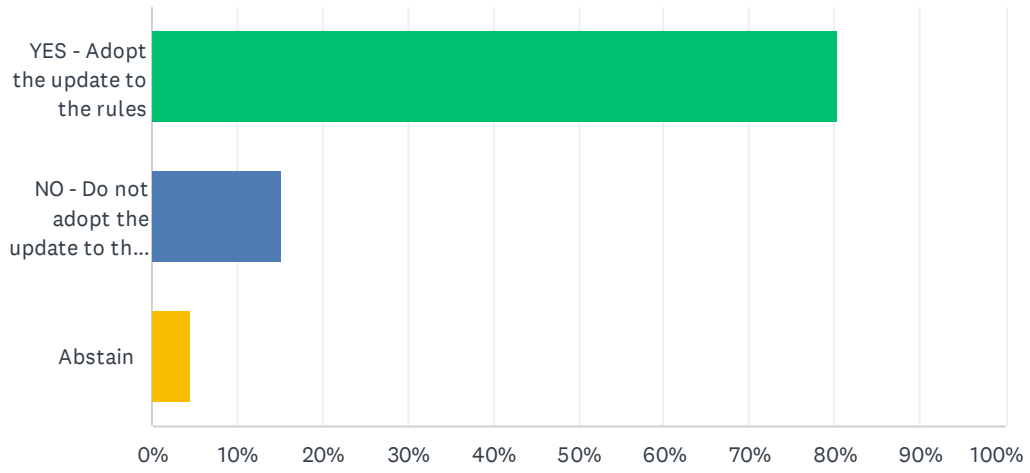

Q2 In the past, some teams have utilized these rules above to gain a forfeit win(s) after the series has taken place. They notice after the fact, that a player participated in games that was not listed on their opponents roster. In most cases, players that are not on the official NCSA roster are in fact eligible to compete, but have not been added to the roster at the time of the games. Should the NCSA adopt a rule that states, "Between receiving the opponent's lineup card and the first pitch of the game is the ONLY period of time a team can protest that a player on the lineup card is NOT on the opponent's official NCSA roster." Also, if after first pitch, a player is found to NOT be on the opponents official NCSA roster, the violating player is ejected for the remainder of the game. All statistics and game results prior to the violating player being ejected will remain official. This will encourage teams to check lineup cards against online rosters before games take place in an effort to make sure teams are in compliance. If after the game has started, a player is found to NOT be on a roster, the opposing teams can still bring this up to the violating team and umpire. If the player is not on the roster, they will be ejected from the game, but all results prior to the ejection will stand. Teams must remember that ROSTER VIOLATIONS are an On-Field Protest and must utilize the On-Field Protest protocol detailed in the NCSA rulebook. Regardless of if this rule passes or not, the NCSA will update the rulebook wording to state "subject to forfeits" instead of "issued forfeits or penalized by forfeiting" for the above-mentioned rules. This will reiterate that roster violations are an on-field protest and the NCSA rulebook will reference that teams must "See On-Field Protest Verbiage." (NCSA Recommendation = YES, adopt the rule)

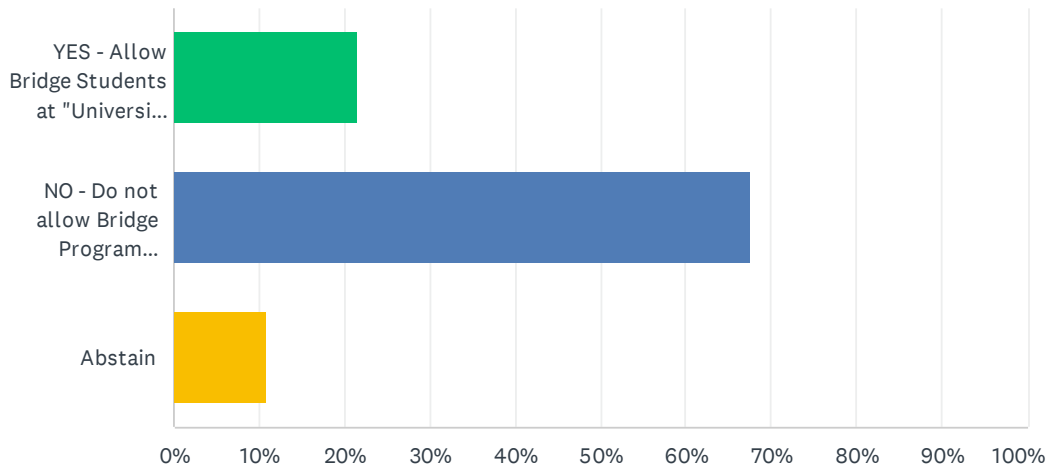

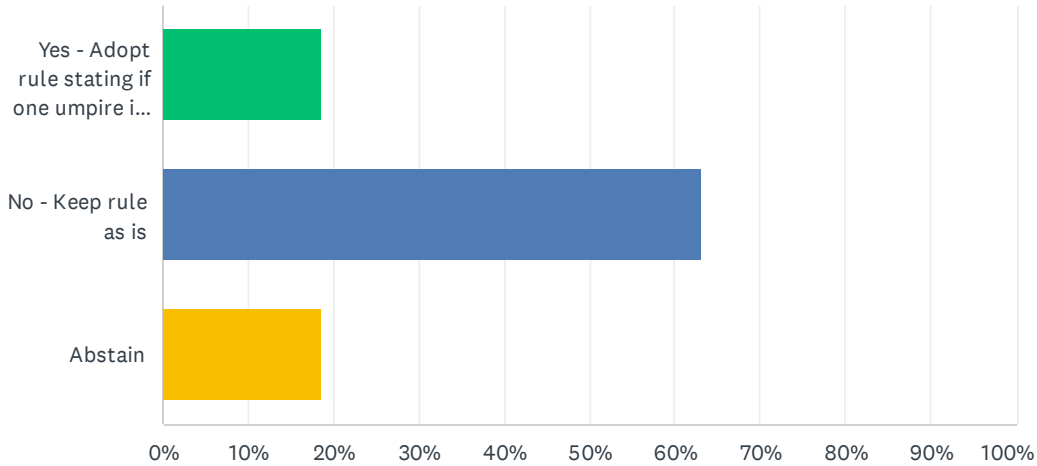

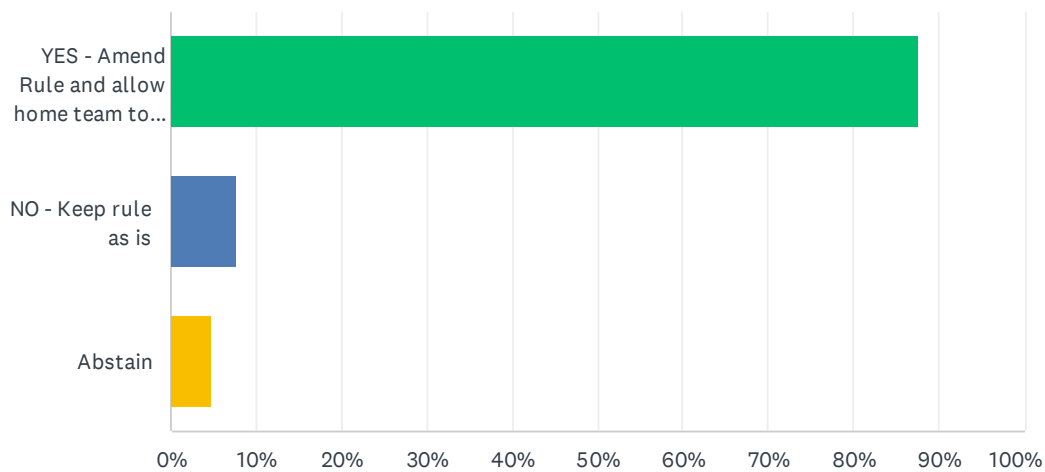

Q5 NCSA Teams usually schedule games in two hour increments. For example at 10am, 12pm and 2pm. Following the NCSA rules above, if umpires do not show up by 10:30am, Game 1 is forfeited to the visiting team. The Home team would then have an additional 45 minutes to get umpires to the field by 11:15am, or the 2nd game is also forfeited to the visiting team. Should the NCSA amend the rule, so the 2nd and 3rd game (if a tripleheader was scheduled) is forfeited if no umpires arrive by the official scheduled start of the 2nd game (12pm)? If so, and a home team is able to get umpires by the scheduled start of game number 2, games 2 and 3 can be played but a forfeit win will be given to the visiting team for Game 1.(NCSA Recommendation = YES, amend this rule to allow home team until the scheduled start of Game 2 to get umpires)

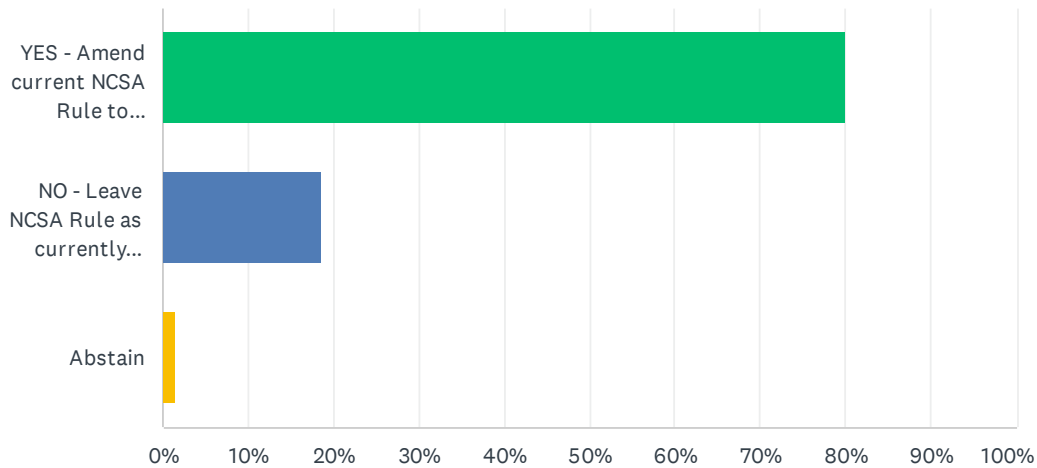

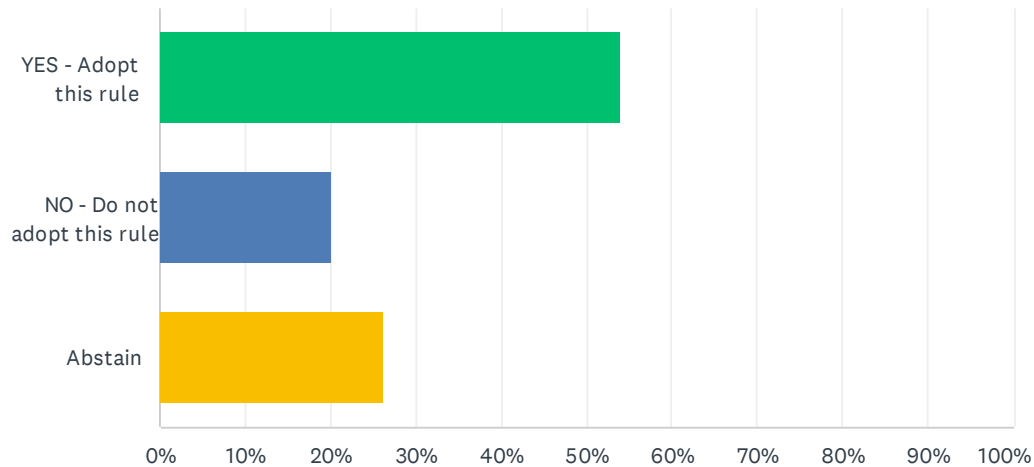

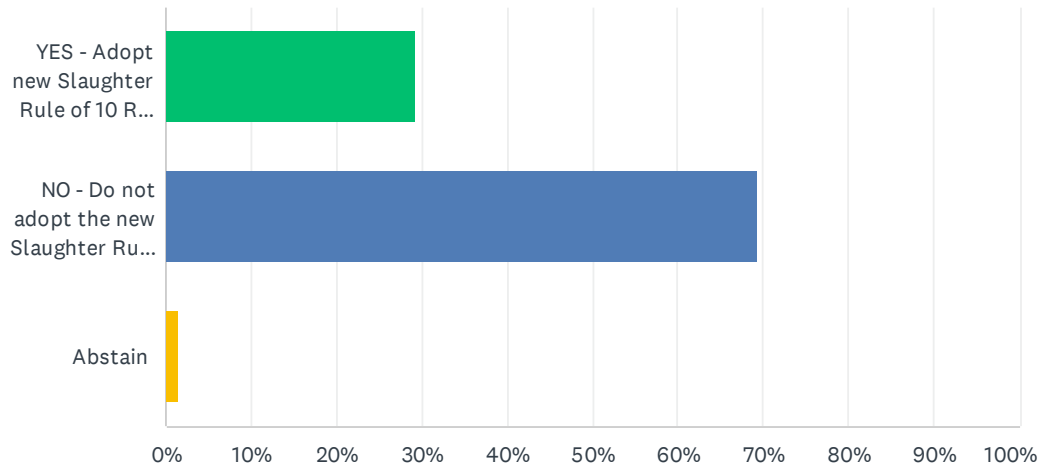
